City Tax Rate to Decrease

The City of Burlington 2010 Budget was approved on December 1st after several weeks of deliberations by the Common Council. The city portion of the tax rate for 2008 was \$7.52 and is set to decrease for 2009 to \$7.49 per \$1000 of assessed value while maintaining the funding for the critical needs of the City. The budget attempts to address the rising demand for services and infrastructure needs, while responding to the slow growth in property values, a (9.38%) decrease in state aids, and increasing costs for utilities, fuel, and raw materials.

The total equalized value for Racine and Walworth counties in 2009 is \$918.9 million. Residential property values comprise approximately 62.2 percent of total property values for 2009, while commercial and

manufacturing property comprises approximately 29.7 and 4.0 percent of total equalized property values, respectively.

The anticipated (3.71%) decrease in revenue and 0.42 percentage increase in General Fund expenditures exhibits an overall conservative approach to this year's budget allowing for the tax rate to decrease while providing funding for needed

equipment purchases, funding the contractually obligated salary increases, increasing support for the Burlington Library and Park Development Fund, and maintaining an aggressive capital improvements program. In summary, a fiscally sound General Fund Budget for 2010 addresses the pressing needs of the City, maintains the current level of services and is projected to decrease the city portion of the tax rate.

Real Estate Tax Season 2009

As a result of last year's success the City of Burlington will continue our partnership with two of the local banks in hope of making the process of paying Real Estate Taxes more convenient.

In efforts to give you more opportunities to pay your Real Estate Taxes, Fox River State Bank and M & I Bank (local branches only) will be collecting taxes on behalf of the City so you can take advantage of their extended business hours, weekend hours, and various other services.

This will only be applicable for the first installment due by January 31, 2010; the second installment will still be paid to the Racine County Treasurer by July 31, 2010. The City will accept payments by mail to P.O. Box 477, Burlington, WI 53105, or by credit card at www.officialpayments.com however, neither the City nor the banks will be issuing cash refunds, a refund check will be mailed to your home within two weeks.

Also new this year, **CITY HALL WILL BE CLOSED ON DECEMBER 31ST**. However, Fox River State Bank will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and M & I Bank will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. In addition, on the next business day, January 4 all payments have the option to be placed in 2009 or 2010 for income tax purposes. City Hall will also accept postmarked mail.

City of Burlington Low Cost Pet Licensing

State and municipal law dictates that all dogs and cats 5 months and older be licensed with the city by March 31 of each year. City of Burlington tags will be available January 1 at City Hall for 2010. If you are licensing your pet for the first time or you have recently vaccinated your pet, a rabies certificate must be presented at the time of licensing. The City of Burlington is proud to offer low cost fees for licensing as follows:



Altered (fixed) dogs and cats \$4.00

Unaltered dogs and cats \$8.00

After March 31 a \$5 late fee is added to the cost of the tag. Residents that move to the city or have a pet that reaches 5 months of age after the deadline date will not be charged the late fee. A move within the city does not qualify for this exception. Not only is it a requirement of the city to license your pet, the tag numbers are listed with the Burlington Police Department. If your pet were to stray, the tag is a valuable resource to bring them back home quickly.



City Snow Removal Policies

The winter weather will soon be upon us, and along with this weather also comes snow. Keeping the sidewalks clear of snow and ice is something that is not only a courtesy to other people in your neighborhood for walking, but also required by City Ordinance.

City crews make every effort possible to safely remove snow from all streets in a timely manner as soon as possible after a snowfall. State highways are

Sidewalks

As the owner, occupant or person in charge of a residence(s) in the City, you

are responsible for the removal of any snow and ice that has accumulated on the sidewalk in the front of the residence(s) within 18 hours of the snowfall.

Any ice that has formed on the sidewalk must be treated to prevent the area from being dangerous. Failure to maintain the sidewalk within this 18-hour timeframe may result in the Street Dept. cleaning your sidewalk in which case the City will bill the owner(s).

(Per City Code the amount charged for snow removal will be at the City's full cost.)

the first streets to be plowed, followed by the main (arterial) streets, side streets, and then parking lots and alleys.

Please remember that snow removal in front of a mailbox is the property owner's responsibility. City crews will make every effort to plow as close to the mailbox as possible.

Concerns/Questions regarding snow removal should be made to the Street Department at 763-2060.

Snow Removal From City Hydrants

The City of Burlington Water Utility is asking residents and community businesses to adopt their neighborhood fire hydrants during the winter season. You can do this by clearing accumulated snow around hydrants near their homes and places of employment.

Snow removal around fire hydrants is the responsibility of utility employees, however, during heavy winter storms, hydrants may become buried for some time before utility crews reach all of the hydrants in the City. By keeping the snow removed from around the hydrants, precious time is saved for the Fire Department in case of a fire. The house you save might just be your own!

The City of Burlington thanks all the residents in the past that have "adopted" the fire hydrant in their neighborhood and helped to keep the fire hydrant clear and visible. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.



Changes Coming Soon to Recycling Collection

The City recently extended the Solid Waste and Recycling Contract with Veolia Environment Services for an additional five years. Veolia ES has been providing services to residents since 2006 (formerly Onyx which provided service since 1999). As part of the extension, changes will be made to the Recycling Program offered to residents.



Beginning February 8, 2010 recycling pick up will change to a bi-weekly (every other week) automated service, as shown in the picture to the right. Veolia ES will deliver 95-gallon roll-out carts to

each residence the last two weeks of January for the new service. Below are important facts regarding the change:

- Recycling will continue to be co-mingled to include glass, plastic, cardboard and paper.
- Recycling must be placed in the 95-gal. cart for pick-up. Items outside of the container will not be collected.
- The cart should be placed on the curb, not on the street for automated pick-up.

• Each residence will receive one recycling cart. Additional carts can be purchased through Veolia for the cost of the cart.

• Solid waste collection will continue to be held on a weekly basis on the same day of the week you currently have.

• Recycling pick-up will be held the same day of the week with every other week pick-up.

• Weekly collection will continue until

January 29 and resume bi-weekly on February 8.

Practice Fire Safety Guidelines this Winter

The holidays are here! This time of year it is especially important to be informed about home fire safety because most fires are reported in the winter months. Many of the winter month fires originate in the kitchen. Also holiday decorations and Christmas trees result in nearly 1,000 fires annually. Please take a few minutes from your busy holiday plans and read the following fire safety tips. They may save you and your family's life.



Kitchen Safety

- Keep cloth and paper products away from heating sources.
- Keep your hair and long sleeves from dangling over burners.
- Use the proper size burner.

- Turn pot handles inward and never turn your back to cooking food.
- Use only microwave safe dishes.
- Never use anything metal in your microwave.
- Be sure to shut the stove off when not in use.
- Never use the stove to heat your home.

Holiday Safety

- Use artificial trees and make sure it's fire retardant.
- Use natural trees if it has good color and check the water everyday.
- Remove the tree at the first sign of dryness.
- Inspect your lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections.
- Never overload outlets.
- Unplug lights before you leave or go to bed.

Helpers are primarily 60+ years of age and must complete an application (including a criminal background check). Clients are also typically 60+ years and older.

Get a Free Digital Thermometer!



In our continuing effort to reduce mercury in the environment, the City of Burlington is offering an opportunity for our citizens to replace used mercury thermometers with a new free battery operated digital thermometer provided to us by the Wisconsin Department of Health. Citizens may bring as many used mercury thermometers they have in exchange for one digital thermometer per household at no cost!!

Stop by the Wastewater Treatment Plant Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. located at 6551 South Pine Street.

Exposure to mercury can cause a variety of health effects. Depending on the level of exposure, mercury can cause damage to the nervous system, brain, liver, and the immune system. Mercury is released into the environment from sources such as coal-fired power plants, medical waste incubators, and many household products such as fluorescent light bulbs, thermostat switches, and button batteries.

Stay Safe on the Road This Winter



According to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, about 17,000 vehicle accidents and 7,000 injuries occur in the state each winter when

roads are covered with snow, ice, or slush. We ask that you get into the habit of ensuring that you and your passengers are safely buckled up before these road conditions becomes a daily reality.

Adult Seat Belt Use

As of June 30, 2009, Wisconsin law enforcement officers can stop and issue a citation for those not wearing a seat belt under primary enforcement. This *primary enforcement* means that an officer can stop a vehicle based solely on a seat belt violation. Those subject to a citation include drivers, drivers with unrestrained passengers, and passengers themselves.

This means that a driver may be held responsible for unbelted passengers.

Child Safety Seat Use

Child safety seat violations are primary enforcement as well. Also remember that Wisconsin law does not allow for a child to be removed from a safety restraint to attend to the child's personal needs such as diapering, nursing, or feeding while the vehicle is moving. Please use the following guidelines when it comes to child safety seats:

- When a child is less than 1 **or** weighs less than 20 lbs., the child must be in a rear-facing child seat in the back seat (if the vehicle has a back seat).
- When a child is at least 1 but not yet 4 **or** weighs between 20 and 40 lbs., the child must be in a forward-facing child seat in the back seat.
- When a child is at least 4 but not yet 8 **or** weighs between 40 and 80 lbs. **or** is under 4ft. 9in., the child must be in a booster seat.

- When a child is 8 or older **or** weighs more than 80 lbs. **or** is at least 4ft. 9in., the child must wear a safety belt.

With a scheduled appointment, the Western Racine County Health Department (763-4930) provides free child safety seat inspections for western Racine County residents.

A Year In Review

Each day the City strives to provide services to its residents and business owners to create a full-functioning and pleasant atmosphere each citizen is proud to call home. Below are a few changes and developments City Departments experienced over the past year to achieve these goals for its residents.

DPW - Water & Wastewater

The methane recovery and burning operation was implemented this year at the Wastewater Treatment Plant that greatly reduces the electricity used for plant operations.

A Mercury Minimization Ordinance was put in place allowing city officials to work with the private sector to reduce its discharge of mercury into the city's wastewater system.

A mercury collection program has been started for residents to dispose of mercury thermometers and light bulbs year round at the WWTP.

Rainbarrels were sold to residents at a high success rate by the Water Department to increase conservation actions.

DPW - Streets & Parks

The City was awarded stimulus funds to reconstruct Kane Street, saving thousands of dollars in future street repair projects.

The Public Works Department purchased four new plow trucks to improve winter snow removal service, saving approximately \$100,000 over four years.

The Parks Department entered into a contract with Racine County to maintain Bushnell Park.

City officials have begun to move forward with plans for a Combined Public Works Facility that will combine the Street, Park, Water and Wastewater Departments.

Police Department

The Police & Fire Commission is conducting a country-wide search for a new Police Chief that is currently still active.

Two new officers were sworn in this year, Jodi Borchardt and William Rice.

The Police Department implemented a new program linking officers to specific aldermanic districts, offering residents another outlet to express their concerns.

City Hall

Videos were released on the City website this fall to promote tourism, relocation to the city and commercial prospects.

The Downtown Redevelopment Program has been initiated to redevelop parts of Dodge Street, E. Washington Street and E. Chestnut Street. Plans include construction of a hotel, parking garage and a three-story commercial building.

Former City Attorney Tom Kircher retired after serving the city for ten years. John Bjelajac was hired as the new City Attorney this fall.

New construction commenced in the city with the opening of the Veterans Terrace at Echo Park, Pick N Save and RexCon.

The City is working with all communities of Racine County to create a Multi-Jurisdictional Comprehensive Plan for consistency in future land-use planning.

Public Library

The Library has seen record attendance with increasing book and video rentals in recent months.

Nintendo Wii gaming systems were purchased to offer weekly activities for children and adults.

Fire Department

The Fire Department completed its fleet with the purchase of a Pierce PUC Engine. This finalized the six vehicle upgrade to the fleet in seven years without using any borrowed funds.

Fire fighters offered several fire safety courses to students at local schools throughout the year to enhance public awareness.




Adult Book Discussion Group
