

Dear Citizens:

Your City of Burlington Fire Department is comprised of forty-six volunteer and four career firefighters dedicated to the task of providing first-rate protection for our community. Whether a fire, hazardous materials incident, accident, or other tragedy, we are here to serve you. Our volunteer personnel contributed almost seven thousand hours of their personal time for emergency operations, training sessions, fire prevention and education activities, and other events during the previous year. I am extremely proud of these members and commend them for their accomplishments and dedication to duty.

The City of Burlington has recently received the results of the Insurance Services Office (ISO) audit conducted to verify the Public Protection Classification rating for our city. The City of Burlington continues to maintain the class 3 status awarded in the previous (1998) audit. This rating measures the municipality's fire protection services to help establish appropriate fire insurance premiums for residential, commercial, and industrial properties. Ratings are done approximately every ten to twelve years for communities under 25,000 population.

The audit measures the following components of a community's fire protection service:

- (1) Receiving and handling fire alarms (10% of rating)
- (2) Fire department services (50% of rating)
- (3) Water supply (40% of rating)

ISO rates all communities on a scale from 1 (highest) to 10 (lowest). Currently there are 1,678 rated communities in the State of Wisconsin. No state fire department holds a class 1 rating. Only twenty-three departments have a rating (class 2) that is higher than that of our city. Those departments are almost exclusively career (fully-paid) fire departments. The class 3 rating places the City of Burlington at the 98.6 percentile in the state of Wisconsin. Nationally, the City of Burlington also ranks at the 98.6 percentile. Out of 47,242 communities rated, only 653 (1.4%) have received a higher rating. This is definitely an evaluation that all members of the Burlington community can be extremely proud of.

The City of Burlington Fire Department is a member of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) Division #102 (Racine County). MABAS is comprised of fire departments from Wisconsin, Illinois, and many other states. The primary purpose of MABAS is not to relieve the communities of their responsibilities for providing adequate emergency services to all local emergencies, because communities should have their own first line of defense plus local reserves. However, when a community exhausts these resources, the MABAS system can be activated by the stricken community, and through a systematic structure MABAS will provide:

- (1) Immediate assistance of manpower and equipment at the scene during a large fire, medical emergency or other disaster.
- (2) Response teams of firefighters, emergency medical technicians, hazardous material technicians, technical rescue teams, divers, and/or other specialized personnel and equipment.
- (3) Access to specialized equipment that one department may find cost prohibitive to own.

MABAS gives us the benefit of developing resources throughout the state that can be shared among departments, such as communications, equipment, manpower, training and operational strategies. This agreement strengthens not only the local fire departments, but the resources of the State of Wisconsin, and beyond, as a whole.

As we progress through the coming year, long range planning and departmental goals will be analyzed and established. Some of these will include:

- (1) Continued evaluation and recommendations for long range vehicle, equipment, and facilities replacements/additions with corresponding funding projections.
- (2) A review of technology needs for the fire service with emphasis on the local implementation in a timely manner.
- (3) Continued community programs and other activities that stress fire prevention and education for citizens of all ages.

Noteworthy is also the fact that while many volunteer fire departments are struggling with a shortage of firefighters, the City of Burlington Fire Department is currently at a staffing level of forty-six volunteer members plus four career (full-time) employees. Your volunteer firefighters do not receive any direct monetary compensation for their time and efforts. In fact, they are assessed a small fine if they miss an alarm, training session, or meeting. As you will see elsewhere in this report, your fire department responded to 172 incidents during 2011.



Mission Statement:



The goal of the Burlington Fire Department is to protect and preserve the lives and property of the citizens and visitors of the City of Burlington and it's surrounding communities from the adverse effects of fires, natural disasters or the exposure to other hazardous conditions.

We achieve this objective through an effective fire prevention & education program, an established training curriculum and prompt response by a diverse organization of career and volunteer personnel.

City of Burlington Fire Department



Before 1877 there was no organized fire department in Burlington. In 1864 and then again in 1874 the Pliny-Perkins flour and grist mill burned twice. In those early years cisterns were built in various locations to provide a source of water. And fires were fought using small hand pumps and leather buckets. **October 1877:** It was determined that Burlington needed organized fire protection. Forty-five volunteers banded together to form Hose Co. #1. Five hundred dollars was raised to purchase a hand operated fire pump, a hose reel and five hundred feet of hose for their fire suppression efforts. All firefighting equipment had to be pulled by hand to fire scenes. The only means to alert firemen is a large bell on top of the city hall. **March 1878:** The Hook and Ladder Co. was formed with a membership of thirty-five men. The two companies were headquartered in the rear of the old city hall. **February 1879:** The newly organized fire department prevented what could have been a disastrous fire in the Klingele Store building. **July 1887:** Additional clapper is installed on fire bell to distinguish sound from bells on trains that sometimes confuse firemen. **March 1896:** Hose Co. #2 is organized. **August 1896:** New steam whistle at the water works pumping station replaces fire bell.

1900 - 1909

August 1902: Ordinance 17 is passed – First fireman to take hose cart or other apparatus to a fire will receive \$2. **Sept 1902:** Burlington Malting Company destroyed by fire. It is the most disastrous fire in Burlington history to this time. **May 1907:** New fire alarm system is installed in Burlington. Fire alarm boxes are placed at 10 strategic locations.

1910-1919

April 1910: Mayor H. E. Zimmermann establishes the Police and Fire Commission. **October 1915:** The department replaces its horse drawn fire apparatus with Nash truck.

1920-1929

January 1924: The department receives a new Seagrave pumper and the Nash truck is replaced with a new Peter Pirsch pumper. **March 1928:** The fire department rethreads all apparatus, fire hydrant and fire hose couplings to meet the national standard.

1930-1939

April 1930: Burlington fire department protects the Towns of Burlington, Wheatland and Lyons. **February 1934:** Burlington and Lake Geneva have a reciprocal contract for aid with serious fires.

1940-1959

October 1945: Racine County assigns a new trailer mounted fire pump and equipment to the city for civilian defense during the war.

In 1954 an FWD 1,000 gallons-per-minute engine was purchased. About this time, a U. S. government surplus truck with a 300 gallons-per-minute pump was added.

1960-1979

March 1969: The current Firehouse at 165 W. Washington is built.

June 1974: A new ladder truck and pumper are delivered to the fire department. The ladder truck has an aerial ladder that can reach 85 feet and the pumper is capable of delivering 1000 gallons of water a minute. Both pieces of apparatus were built by the Peter Pirsch Company in Kenosha, WI. **July 1977:** St. Mary's Church is gutted by fire. Sometime in the early 1970's a new radio paging system is used to alert members in case of a fire.

In 1978 a Ford 1 ton 4x4 pickup with slide-in pump and tank replaced the government truck.

1980-1989

In 1980 Engine 920, a Peter Pirsch engine, joined the fleet. The slide-in pump and tank was moved to a 1986 Chevrolet 4-door 1 ton dual wheel pickup truck. During 1988, Engine 925 replaced the 1954 FWD engine.

1990-1999

1996 was a big year for apparatus purchases with the arrival of Platform 924 and Engine 923. In 1997 Pickup 922 replaced the 1978 Ford.

2000-2009

In February 2001 the 1980 Pirsch was replaced with a new Pierce engine, Engine 920.

In 2005 the eighty five foot Pirsch was replaced with a 2005 Pierce 75 ft. Aluminum Aerial Ladder truck with a 1500 GPM Pump.

The Department continues to be strong in 2012 with 46 volunteers and four career firefighters.



The City of Burlington utilizes four full-time members at the fire department. Duties of these individuals include: driver/operator of department apparatus, fire suppression, fire prevention & education activities, fire inspection and code enforcement, plan reviews, apparatus maintenance, facilities maintenance, clerical/administrative work, public relations and post-dispatch of Burlington EMS. Engineers work schedule is a 24 hour duty shift followed by 48 hours off, while the Inspector works a 40 hour/week shift. This work schedule is to insure 24 hour fire protection and prompt response in the case of an emergency.

2011 Staff Activities

-Trainings: Fire Department members participated in 3,327 hours of company drills, general drills, MPO trainings, state certified fire classes and other miscellaneous elective drills.

-Fire Calls: Fire Department members spent a total of 3,079 hours at fire incidents or during clean-up after fire calls. Types of incidents included are general fire alarms, mutual aid alarms, company #4 alarms and non-emergency alarms.

-Fire Prevention: Fire Department personnel spent 2,620 hours on fire prevention. This category includes fire inspection and code enforcement, public education, public relations and fire investigations.

-Station/truck maintenance: Hours spent on apparatus and firehouse maintenance totals 1,145 hours.

-Clerical Duties: 1,460 hours were spent on the day-to-day activities in the alarm office. They include but are not limited to data entry, plan reviews and telephone/radio communications.




Fire Prevention Bureau

It is commonly said that the fire service is the only organization that tries to put itself out of business. The City of Burlington Fire Department utilizes an exceptional program for the prevention of fire and other emergencies. This goal is accomplished by three major components; public education/public relations, fire inspection/code enforcement and post-fire investigation.

Public Education/Public Relations is a critical component in the overall goal of the fire service. Throughout the year we attend Public events offering educational pamphlets, displaying our Fire Apparatus and Equipment, and providing Adult Fire Extinguisher training. During The National Fire Prevention Week we visit the schools featuring an "In the Classroom" approach; this provides the students an opportunity to be one on one with a Firefighter. During 2011, on 44 different occasions department personnel spent 509 hours educating the public about the importance of fire safety.



Fire inspection and fire code enforcement is at the forefront of the Fire Department. Through education we provide businesses, apartments, and health care facilities the tools they need to comply with State and Local fire Codes and to keep their clients and residents safe. 1,000 fire inspections were completed last year with a sum of 2,000 hours dedicated to those inspections.

Through Fire Investigation we determine cause and origin of a fire which gives the Fire Department the tools needed to educate the community and determine if a criminal act was committed. A monetary value of what is saved and lost is also determined by investigations. A total of 48 hours were spent on six different fire investigations in 2011. The total combined value of all properties investigated totaled \$1,625,000. Only three percent of the total value was lost by fire while ninety seven percent was saved by the fire department.

Department Training Program

The Burlington Fire Department training program is a comprehensive, aggressive program dedicated to training its members in the fundamentals of fire suppression, property preservation fire prevention, fire inspection and investigative procedures. Trainings for department members are conducted on a weekly basis in various formats and styles. The Fire Chief oversees the department's training program and instructors can range from department officers, career personnel or even department members.

Every month the department meets as a whole and members participate in a "General Drill." Fire companies also meet once a month and company officers supervise "Company Drills." Members seeking the rank of Motor Pump Operator (MPO) as well as current MPO's attend monthly driver/operator trainings. Also available to department members are a variety of extra and/or elective drills through-out the month.

Both career and volunteer members of the Burlington Fire Department continue to develop better skills and techniques through training. The fulltime staff works hand-in-hand with volunteer members to enhance training in all areas of their duties.

2011 Incident Responses

The City of Burlington Fire Department responds to a wide array of emergency incidents. The type of alarm is classified into the following categories: General Fire Call, Mutual Aid Call, Company #4 Call and Non-Emergency Call. The type of alarm is assigned to the incident based on the reason for fire department response.

General Fire Call: Structure Fires, Fire Alarms, Vehicle Fires, Haz-Mat and Brush Fires.

Mutual Aid Calls: Any response to an agency outside the city.

Company #4 Calls: Motor Vehicle Accidents, CO Alarms and EMS Assists.

Non-Emergency Calls: Burning Violations, CO Alarm Problems and Good Intent Calls.

In 2011 The City of Burlington Fire Department responded to 172 alarms. Below and on the following pages you will find a breakdown of those incidents, including charts, graphs and a chronological list of every call.





Average Turnout Percentage Per Alarm Type





■ General Alarm "GA" ■ Mutual Aid "MA"

Number of Incidents Per Alarm Type










Property Type Breakdown:

Residential: 1 or 2 family dwellings, Multifamily dwellings, Apartment buildings and Commercial hotel/motels.

Special Properties: Highways, Residential streets, Commercial street, Railroad right-of-ways and Vehicle parking areas.

Health Care: Hospitals, Clinics, Doctor offices and Nursing homes.

Mercantile/Business: Grocery stores, Gas stations Vehicle sales, services or repair, General retail and Business offices.

Manufacturing/Processing: Mostly refers to any business that manufactures and/or processes something. Generally these properties are found in the industrial parks.

Educational: High school, Junior high school, middle school and Adult education center or college.

Assembly: Bowling establishments, Swimming facilities, Convention centers, Restaurants and Bars.

Undetermined: Refers to an incident when the department was notified but cancelled before arriving at the location or when the department receives a request to staff another agencies firehouse with a piece of apparatus and personnel.
