Office of the Mayor



The City of Burlington has had a hospital in our community for over ninety years. During those decades, the hospital has increased its services and medical care such that it can take care of any and all of the health care needs of our citizens and the citizens in the surrounding areas.

In return, the City of Burlington and the entire local community have strongly supported the hospital and its health care mission. The existence of a full-service hospital in Burlington has always been a matter of pride and great comfort, giving confidence to everyone living in Burlington and the surrounding areas that good health care is accessible when needed.

As you have recently been reading in the news media, however, the full-service nature of the Burlington Hospital is about to change and unfortunately not for the better. It has been announced by the Aurora Health Care system that this coming summer the Burlington Hospital will no longer be providing a birthing center for the delivery of babies in our community.

Aurora has stated that the reasons for the changes are based on lower numbers of births occurring here in Burlington, and that it does not make fiscal sense to keep the unit open. Aurora will be sending the delivery cases to Aurora Lakeland Hospital in Elkhorn.

Aurora has also advised us that this is the same type of model that they employed for St. Luke's hospital in Milwaukee. St. Luke's no longer has a birthing center and now sends OB patients to the Women's Resource center in West Allis or to St. Jude's Hospital in Milwaukee. This model works for Milwaukee where both the Women's Resource Center and St. Jude's are each under 15 minutes driving time on well lit city streets. To expect a pregnant woman to travel an additional 25 to 30 minutes on snow covered back roads to get to Aurora Lakeland Medical Center is not the same as traveling on well lit City streets.

When young couples are looking for a City to move to they look at several different things. Is there a good paying job there, what are the schools like, what is the City like and is there good Health care available? By closing the OB department in Burlington, Aurora is removing one of the needed criteria young people are looking for. This will cause young couples to decide to locate somewhere other than Burlington.

The continued existence of a birthing center in Burlington is critical to continued good health care in our community. Aurora has been publicly asked to reconsider its stated decision to close its birthing center at the hospital, and, as the Mayor of the City of Burlington, I again ask Aurora, to keep the hospitals birthing center open. Aurora has in the past demonstrated, through its actions, its commitment to provide good health care to the community, and I urge Aurora to again confirm that commitment by continuing its birthing center at the hospital.

I am willing to work with Aurora to make this happen. If Aurora, however, ultimately does close the birthing center at the hospital, I will work, in good faith with them in the future, in all health care matters. At the same time, however, it will then be important for the City of Burlington to work with other health care organizations to continue to provide, at the very least, a birthing service in Burlington. This component of our community health care needs is just too important to do otherwise.


Property Assessment Revaluation is Scheduled for 2013

The Common Council recently approved a contract with Accurate Appraisal to conduct a full market revaluation of all city properties in 2013 to bring the equalization factor back into alignment at 100%. According to the rates and figures used to generate the 2012 tax bills, the City's equalization factor is at 107%. For example, an average home value assessed at \$195,000 shows an equalized value of \$182,243. The equalized value is the average Market Value for the City. State Statutes require revaluations when the equalization factor approaches 10% plus or minus the assessed value. Typical revaluations occur in the State of Wisconsin every five years. The last revaluation in

the City was in 2006. An in-home inspection is not required for the full market revaluation.

In addition, Accurate Appraisal will be conducting a full-value maintenance program from 2014–2018. A full value assessment keeps all property values at 100% of market value every year, by physically inspecting a quarter of the properties in the city per year. This program will include an in-home inspection of all properties, an analysis of sale properties, an inspection of new construction, and a check on all properties that took out a building permit throughout the municipality. After a thorough analysis of all sale properties we

will adjust values according to style and neighborhood of the property based on 100% full market value.



2013 Spring Election



The Spring Election, scheduled for Tuesday, April 2, 2013 include aldermanic positions from each of the four districts in the City of Burlington. Terms for these positions will begin April 16, 2013.

Absentee Ballots

Help Wanted - Election Inspectors

If you have an interest in being appointed as an election inspector at the polls, please contact city hall and we will add your name to the list. Election inspectors are paid an hourly wage and may choose to work the whole day or work a shift.

Performance Dashboard Available!

The City of Burlington launched one of the most comprehensive government transparency tools today – The City of Burlington Performance Dashboard. Located at the city's main webpage, [www.burlington-wi.gov](http://www.burlington-wi.gov), the performance dashboard provides our citizens with real-time information about all of the City's primary functions. It includes a monthly accounting of all the City's General Fund revenue and expenditures, by department and several other transparency tools.



Most importantly it provides data on most of the city's activities. The public can see how many hours are spent on items such as leaf pick-up, the number of traffic violations issued, and even drill down to see the average cost per mile of running the city's fleet. The program also provides a comparison of the City of Burlington's operation to 10 other cities of similar size and demographics. The Common Council and the city staff are currently using the information to inform citizens of policy choices, develop budgets and monitor employee performance.

Information can be compared over the previous year, and can be compared to the city's adopted budget. The Performance Dashboard is another step the City of Burlington is taking to make their operations more transparent and accessible to the general public. Other recent items have included the City's new website, mailed newsletter, Facebook Page and Twitter account. The City has also recently completed the second year of its Citizen Budget Partners program, which provides citizens the ability to provide direct input on the City's budget.

### Electronic Recycling at DPW Year Round!

The City of Burlington is pleased to announce a new service that will be available to our citizens beginning March 4, 2013. Residents can utilize free electronic recycling at the Department of Public Works facility at 2200 S. Pine Street between the hours of 7 a.m and 2 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The City has arranged through DP Electronic Recycling of Elkhorn, to have aluminum bins placed at our facility. These bins will be located just inside our north gate as you exit off of South Pine Street / Hwy 83.

DP Electronic Recycling will accept virtually anything that can be plugged into a wall and/or runs on batteries.

Please **do not** drop off appliances such as washers, dryers, stoves, refrigerators, water heaters, or boilers. If you have any questions about what else might be acceptable or where to take you appliances please contact DP Electronic Recycling at 262-723-2550.



### Clean Sweep to be Held April 27!

Join us for the 2013 Clean Sweep Program where you can dispose of household hazardous waste, electronics and prescription medicine on Saturday, April 27 from 8 a.m. to noon. With the help of Wisconsin Clean Sweep Grants, the City of Burlington, Town of Burlington, Town of Dover, Village of Rochester, Village of Union Grove and Village of Waterford have collaborated to hold this event at the City of Burlington Public Works Facility, 2200 S. Pine Street, Burlington.

You must be a resident of one of the listed communities and show current identification to participate in the program. Please separate chemicals, electronics, prescriptions, food, clothing and household items before drop off.

Hazardous waste materials are often labeled with indicator words such as "caution", "warning" or "danger". Material that may be toxic, ignitable, corrosive or reactive is also a likely

candidate for disposal. **Latex paint will not be accepted.**

Electronic items include, but are not limited to, appliances, televisions, computers and related equipment, DVD players, personal electronics, phones and video game machines.

For a complete list of acceptable items please visit the City's website at [www.burlington-wi.gov](http://www.burlington-wi.gov) or pick up a brochure at City Hall, 300 N. Pine Street. Ammunition, explosives, medical waste, radioactive materials or syringes will not be accepted.

### Disposal & Recycling of Other Household Materials

#### Brush Pick-Up Service

Brush Pick-Up continues on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Please call in your address to the Department of Public Works at 539-3770 to be placed on the Brush Pick Up List. You must call no later than the Tuesday before the second or fourth Wednesday. The DPW Crew only picks up brush from addresses that have been called in. You may also bring your brush to the Compost Site during operational hours.

#### Oil and Antifreeze Disposal

City of Burlington residents who change

their oil and antifreeze and need a proper place to dispose of these items, may do so at the Department of Public Works building located at 2200 S. Pine Street. Please bring proof of City residency with you.

#### Light Bulb & Mercury Collection

Mercury thermometers and fluorescent lightbulbs can be taken to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, 2100 S. Pine Street, for free disposal.

#### Latex Paint

To dispose of latex paint either remove the lid and let the paint dry or fill the can with

kitty litter and replace the lid. Paint cans can be put out with your regular trash.

#### Recycling

Recycling is collected every other week for single and two-family residences. Items allowed with recycling pick up include: aluminum cans, steel or bi-metal cans, glass (clear, brown and green), plastic bottles coded 1 or 2 on bottom (i.e. plastic milk and soda bottles, etc.), cardboard, office paper, magazines, newspaper, catalogs, phone books and mail.


### Online Utility Bills Now Available

The City of Burlington is pleased to announce a new online utility bill and payment service. Utility customers are able to view their bills online, saving Burlington the cost of printing and mailing bills. Customers participating in online billing receive emails when their bills are ready for viewing. They simply click through and the bill appears with all the information they would have received on a paper bill.

Customers can pay from the comfort of their homes, seven days a week, 24 hours a day. They can log onto our website, [www.burlington-wi.gov](http://www.burlington-wi.gov), and pay by checking or savings or call 877-885-7968 to pay by check or credit card. Paying online by check is a FREE service to our residents; however, our payment processor adds a fee of \$2.99 for credit card payments made by phone.

Residents can also set up Auto-Pay and not have to worry about making payments each quarter. Auto-payments can be for the amount of the bill or a set budgeted amount. Additionally, the information is updated daily so you can see your account history and be notified by email when a new Utility bill arrives. You can also opt out of receiving paper bills, or continue to receive them at your choice.

The City is also achieving top-notch security by choosing Payment Service Network (PSN) which has attained the highest degree of security awarded by the industry. PSN specializes in providing billing, payment and communication services to utility companies and municipalities.

The Compost Site located off of Maryland Avenue will be opening Tuesday, April 2, 2013. The site will remain free of charge to City residents. However, you will be asked to show identification that shows you are a City of Burlington resident. There will be an attendant on site at all times.

Materials accepted include grass, leaves, garden waste, wood chips and brush. The City will not accept brush or logs greater than 5" in diameter. No plastic bags, plastic containers, or foreign debris of any kind. No stumps or root balls will be allowed.

#### Need wood chips or compost?

Residents are able to take wood chips and compost from the compost site for free. You must load and haul the materials yourself.





# Out and About

## Follow the Law - Brake for Pedestrians



and drivers.

When operating a motor vehicle, the driver must yield to pedestrians who have started crossing at an intersection or crosswalk on a "walk" signal or green light if there is no walk signal. The driver must yield to pedestrians who are crossing the highway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk (at an intersection where there are no traffic control

signals). Drivers should not attempt to overtake and pass any vehicle that stops at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian or bicyclist to cross the roadway safely.

As you travel through the City of Burlington you will notice several crosswalk signs in the middle of the roadway. When pedestrians are waiting to cross, drivers must yield and allow the pedestrians to cross.

Pedestrians should keep in mind this law only applies when crossing at a marked crosswalk or unmarked intersection. Pedestrians should always be diligent and take extra care in the evening hours. Never assume drivers can see you and obey traffic rules to reduce

the chance of being struck by a motor vehicle.

Adults need to take special care to teach children to behave safely when they are around vehicular traffic. Supervision is crucial through about age 9. Motorists are also responsible for child pedestrian safety. Slow down in school zones, near parks and pools and in neighborhoods. Parents dropping off children at school are a major threat to walking children and to those leaving motor vehicles. Stay cautious after dropping off your own child.

Both drivers and pedestrians have certain safety responsibilities that depend on both circumstances and common sense.

## Reduced Speed Limit on Pine Street

The speed limit on Pine Street from Milwaukee Avenue to the Burlington Bypass has been reduced by at least 5 MPH. The new speed limits officially took effect February 26, 2013. The new speed limits on Pine Street will be 25 MPH from Milwaukee Avenue to Market Street and 30 MPH from Market Street to the Burlington Bypass. This change was approved at the February 20 Common Council meeting.



## Street and Sidewalk Construction Projects for 2013

The City of Burlington is planning the 2013 construction season. Work includes the following projects:

### Beloit Street

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from Sunset Drive to McHenry Street with spot repairs to the curb and gutter and handicap ramps added as needed.

### Bridge Street

Slag slurry sealing from Adam Street to S. Pine Street. Temporary re-routing and single-lane traffic will occur before and during application.

### E. Chandler Blvd.

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from S. Kane Street to Edward Street with spot repairs to the curb and gutter and handicap ramps added as needed.

### W. Chandler Blvd.

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from Randolph Street to S. Kane Street with spot repairs to the curb and gutter and handicap ramps added as needed.

### James Street

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from Lewis Street to W. Chestnut Street with replacement of the curb and gutter with handicap ramps added as needed. Some sidewalks will be reconstructed. The 3-inch watermain will be replaced. Disruptions in water services may occur where connections are necessary.

### Johnson Street

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from Milwaukee Avenue to Washington Street with spot repairs to the curb and gutter and handicap ramps added as needed. The 3-inch watermain will be replaced. Disruptions in water services may occur where connections are necessary.

### Teutonia Drive

Asphalt pavement will be resurfaced from W. Chestnut Street to the cul-de-sac with spot repairs to the curb and gutter as needed.

### Sidewalk Reconstruction

Sidewalks will be replaced at various locations around the City.

### S. Pine Street

Construction of new sidewalks on the west side of S. Pine Street, from Dunford Drive to a point lying approximately 150 ft. southerly of the South right-of-way line of Hidden Creek Lane.


### Pedestrian Crosswalk

Installation of a crosswalk across S. Pine Street on the north side of the intersection with Hidden Creek Lane, as well as a crosswalk across Hidden Creek Lane on the west side of the intersection with S. Pine Street.

### W. Washington Street

Construction of a parking lot for the Fire Department at 181 W. Washington Street and expansion of the drive approach for the Fire Department.
